


The Framework for Studying Colossians

You were taught Christ Jesus the Lord You received Christ Jesus the Lord Walk in Christ Jesus the Lord

As we saw last week, the first two concepts are past tense, they have already happened for the believers in Colossae. The third one deals with their current and future lives. But their future current and future lives are predicated on their past experiences.

Paul uses this letter to expound to them again what it means to be a Christian.



Colossians has a heavy emphasis on who Jesus is. And Paul does this almost straight out of the gate.

The first two sentences of the third paragraph of this letter describe Christ Jesus the Lord in phrases so sweeping, so laden with import, that their significance is too grand to truly grasp without the aid of the Holy Spirit.

As Paul says in 1 Corinthians 2:12

Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, that we might understand the things freely given us by God.


Pray that God would help us in our study

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him. And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together.


He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him. And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together.

With just these few words we are given a portrait of Jesus that transcends the very universe we inhabit. At the risk of diminishing the grandeur of these verses, we are going to unpack the ideas here under some general headings.



Jesus is God incarnate, that is, God in the flesh. And the emphasis in Colossians brings out three things.

- Jesus allows us to behold and to know God, who is otherwise invisible. (Hebrews 1:3a; John 1:18; John 14:9)
- Jesus is not a man on whom divinity descended, rather he is God in all the fullness that is true of the Father and the Holy Spirit.
- Jesus is a physical human being in which the fullness of deity abides.




Jesus is the most unusual, the most singular, being ever.

The Divine Son descended and became Incarnate, fully God and fully man. He died, was buried, and was resurrected on the third day. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father.

Jesus is unique both among humans and among the members of the Godhead. He is forever fully God and fully human. There has never been or will be another being like him, ever.

Hebrews 2:14-18




Jesus is Preeminent, that is he is supreme over all things. First, he is supreme over creation

- He is... the firstborn of all creation... (1:15)
- For by him all things were created ... all things were created through him and for him. (1:16)
- And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together (1:17)

Firstborn – a title, not necessarily conferred due to birth order, but given to the one who is to be the heir. Psalm 2:7-8; 89:27-28

Jesus is the Source and Sustainer of all creation. All things are derivative, not having independent sources of being. The fabric of our existence finds its substance in the being of Jesus.

What are the implications of this?




Jesus is Preeminent over the church as well.

- He is the head of the body, the church. (1:18a)
- He is the beginning... (1:18b)
- [He is] the firstborn from the dead (1:18c)

Within his supremacy over creation, Jesus is also supreme over his church. Let's look at another passage that deals with this - Ephesians 1:19-23

Why this additional emphasis on Jesus being the head of the church? What do you see when you look at the "thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities" around you?

Hebrews 2:8-9 – ties back into the firstborn from the dead...




Herein lies the tension that we will see Paul address throughout this letter.

...and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross. (1:20)

We live in the time of reconciliation, where the church exists as an outpost of the rule of Christ Jesus the Lord. He is the head of the church, the founder of the church, and his resurrection is the hope of the church.

What happens when your body does not act in accordance with your head (mind/will)?

1 Corinthians 2:16 tells us that "we have the mind of Christ".




I had to invent a word for this category. Christ Jesus the Lord is the Sophotheon, the Wisdom Of God, to the church.

Him we proclaim, warning and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ. (1:28)

...to reach all the riches of full assurance of understanding and the knowledge of God's mystery, which is Christ, in whom are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. (2:2-3)


Paul will go on to address the issue of succumbing to the false wisdom that comes from the world. Christ Jesus the Lord is the antidote to being infected by the world's wisdom.

An absorbed understanding of Christ Jesus the Lord keeps us from having to boil the water of our lives... let me explain.




This represents a water pipe buried under the ground. The water pressure in the pipe is higher than the pressure in the surrounding soil.

Now imagine the pipe represents a church with a good grasp on Christ Jesus the Lord and the soil represents the world and its pressure on the church.



When there is a break in a water pipe, and the pressure inside the pipe is higher than outside the pipe, then the water flows out.


For a healthy church, the congregation is influencing the surrounding culture, rather than succumbing to the worldly pressure.



However, if the water pressure drops, then soil and contaminants can leak into the pipe from the outside, and you have to boil your water to make it safe to drink.

If a church becomes unhealthy, forgetting who Christ Jesus the Lord is, then the worldly pressures, which come in various forms, will leak into the church and influence it in a negative manner.

The pressure in the Colossian church was dropping, and the surrounding cultural influences were leaking into the church, so Paul was strengthening the church by emphasizing Christ Jesus the Lord and exhorting them to remember what they had been taught concerning him.
